SERIES CONCEPT

The Licensed Clinical Psychologist provides professional psychological services, including psychological assessment; individual, group, and family therapy; behavioral-milieu treatment; diagnosis of patients or residents experiencing serious mental and/or emotional disorders. The Licensed Clinical Psychologist also provides consultation regarding treatment strategy to agency staff and staff from community and other State agencies; develops, oversees, and evaluates the use of specialized treatment programs and assists chief psychologist or other administrative superior in planning, conducting, and coordinating activities of the psychology department. The Licensed Clinical Psychologist may review psychological reports prepared by other psychologists.

Positions are primarily found in mental health institutions or hospitals and correctional facilities. They require the willingness work in the environment associated with the position's location and purpose.

DISTINGUISHING FEATURES

This is the second level of a two-level series. It is distinguished from the Psychology Resident by having more direct planning and program development involvement and by responsibility for developing, overseeing, and evaluating the effectiveness of specialized treatment programs administered by psychology and nonpsychology staff. At this level, the employee specializes in treating specific populations such as child/adolescent, forensics, geriatrics, correctional inmates, chronically mentally ill adults, acute/crisis care; and/or in applying advanced techniques such as neuropsychological assessment; and/or program development, assessment and administration.

CERTIFICATION/LICENSURE: possess License as a Clinical Psychologist by the Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners.

KNOWLEDGE, SKILLS, AND ABILITIES (KSA)

- Demonstrated positive interpersonal and communication skills with colleagues, patients, families, physicians, and the community.
- Skill in developing treatment programs for a special population.
- Extensive knowledge of theories and principles of psychotherapy, psychopathology, behavior modification and group processes.
- Extensive knowledge of theories and principles of normal and abnormal human development.
- Extensive knowledge of theories and methods of behavioral analysis and assessment.
- General knowledge of the principles and procedures of basic and applied clinical psychology.
- General knowledge of American Psychological Association ethics.
- Skill in administering, scoring, and interpreting standardized tests of intelligence, achievement, aptitude, personality behaviors, and psychological screening.
- Skill in preparing written reports which contain formal diagnoses and recommendations for treatment.
- Skill in conducting group, individual, and family therapy.
- Skill in maintaining client records which includes recording client behaviors and the factors which influence them.
- Skill in communicating orally in order to explain and persuade.
- Skill in overseeing and evaluating the effectiveness of specialized treatment programs administered by psychology and nonpsychology staff.
- Skill in participating as a member of an interdisciplinary treatment team in developing treatment and behavior modification plans for clients.
- Skill in planning and conducting psychological research.
- Ability to establish and maintain effective relationships with members of interdisciplinary treatment team and other agency staff.
- Ability to provide training in assessment, psychotherapy, and treatment planning techniques.
- Ability to assist in administrative coordination and planning.
