



Operating Energy

Along the "path to zero," reducing the amount of energy required to operate the building and moving to clean energy sources provide environmental benefits, improve conditions for resident health and comfort, and impact property operating expenses.



- 5) Mental health, trauma, healing







"A broadening of my perspective on what health issues are out there. During the focus group, some of the issues and connections on causes were made thanks to our public health partners. We did an exercise where connections were made that I wouldn't have. Realizing we could expand beyond asthma."

Priority Health Needs

- 1) Respiratory Illness
- 2) Mobility
- Mental Health
- 4) Chronic Illness, Food Access, Physical Activity
- 5) Housing Costs & Gentrification

Strategies

- Partnership with local CBOs for programming
- Organized social and physical activity events
- No carpets / no smoking
- Low VOC materials
- Community gardening

Benefits of the HAP

Developers and residents benefit from the Health Action Plan. Performing an HAP at a property can result in:

- Improved financial stability translating to fewer delinquent rents and lower evictions.
- Improved relationship between the housing owner and residents.
- Enhanced reputational and marketing appeal for property owner leading to more partnerships and grant funding.
- Increased resident satisfaction leading to less unit turnover.
- A safer, more connected community for residents.
- Increased internal capacity to work with the public health sector, analyze public health data, engage residents, and translate health needs into building and programmatic solutions.
- Improved understanding of the impact of the activities and design changes from the Health Action Plan have on residents to inform future developments.

Housing for Health Fund

The Housing for Health Fund is unique in aligning **capital investments** to preserve affordable housing combined with development and implementation of a property-level **health action plan** and **on-going monitoring** of self-reported health status of residents.
