- Established in 1988
- Oregon nonprofit corp. 501c3
- Deeply rooted in service to Farmworkers
- Four primary lines of business
 - Real Estate Development
 - Manufactured Housing Cooperative Development
 - Community Loan Fund
 - Family Economic Opportunity Program

Real Estate Development

Housing Developed

- Developed over 3,000 units of housing including:
- 13 single family homes
- 1,428 on-farm bed spaces
- 10 community facilities
- 50 multifamily complexes which total 1,572 units





Manufactured Housing & Cooperative Development

- Converted 23 communities to residents-owned cooperatives
- Preserved over 1,500 households as affordable
- Currently supporting each cooperative with ongoing technical assistance
- Over \$14MM in capital improvements



Community Loan Fund

- Certified Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI)
- \$20MM loan fund
- Four loan products
 - o Predevelopment \$8,706,500.
 - o Construction \$!3,283,384.
 - o Bridge \$17,023,650.
 - Secondary Perm \$6,780,283.

What are Resident-Owned

Cooperatives?

- Permanent, affordable, housing security through stabilized lot rents and <u>NO MORE FEAR OF</u> BEING DISPLACED.
- Wealth-building for underserved community members, homeownership and asset appreciation
- A departure from the powerlessness of the landlord-tenant relationship: democratic control
 of community operations, maintenance, and rules
- High quality of living conditions: health and safety improvements to park infrastructure are commonly integrated into acquisition financing often after decades of owner/seller deferred maintenance
- Civic engagement, leadership skills development, and connected neighbors, which all lead to increased community quality of life

A Brief History

Talent Mobile Estates had long been a hub for gatherings and home to many Latinx members of the Talent, OR area.



On September 8, 2020, the Almeda Wildfire devastated many community members' homes and livelihoods. Included in the fire damage was most of Talent Mobile Estates, with fewer than a dozen of the 99 homes surviving the fire.
